



The Giver of Stars

life becomes a fulfilling, sometimes dangerous, and exhilarating adventure.




Their Eyes Were Watching God

When the plague spreads from London to an isolated village in 1666, a housemaid emerges as an unlikely heroine and healer.


West With Giraffes LYNDA RUTLEDGE




In 1942, Europe remains in the relentless grip of war. Just beyond the tents of the Russian refugee camp she calls home, a young woman speaks her wedding vows.
